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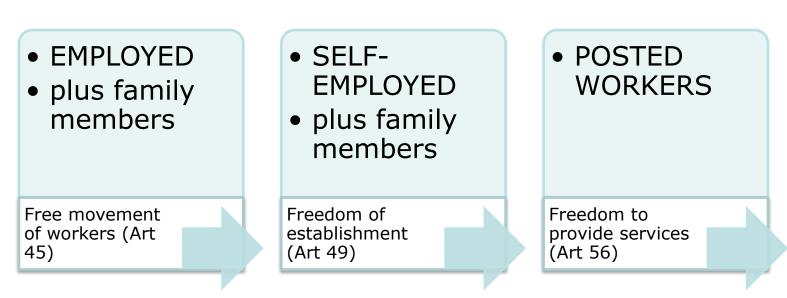

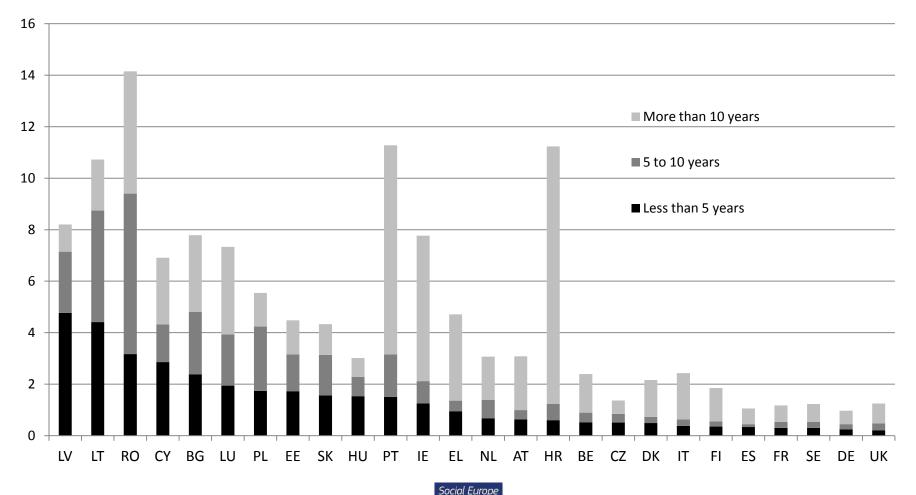

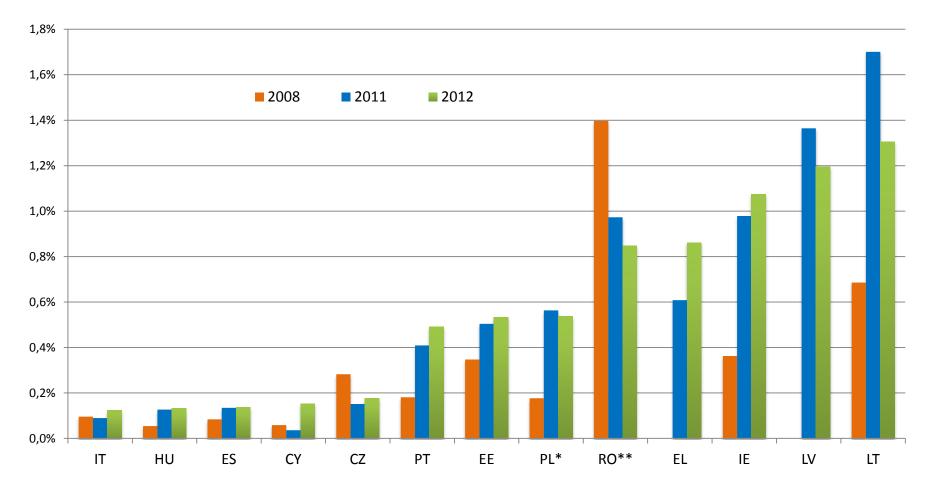
Mobility rate by country— working-age citizens living in another EU country, by years of residence (age group 15-64, 2013, as a percentage of the working-age population of the country of citizenship)







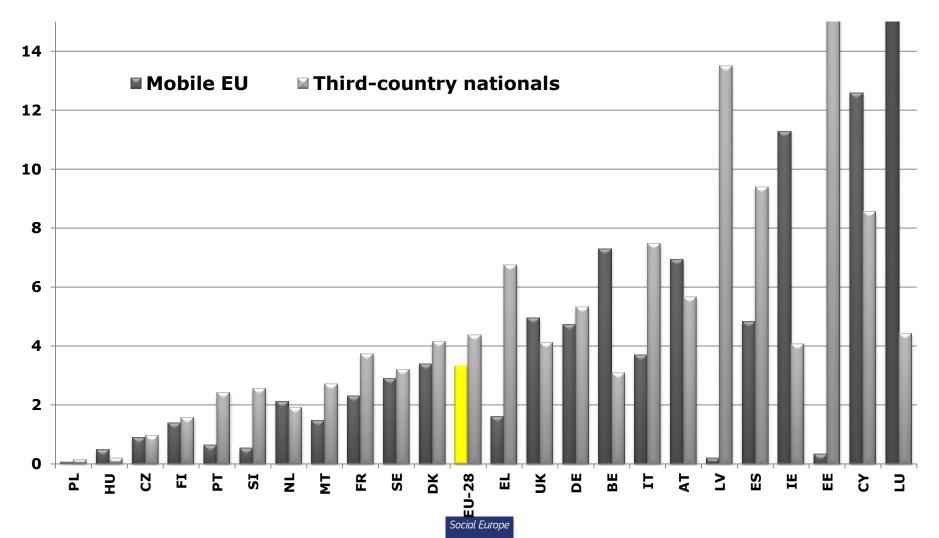
Emigration rate among nationals (as a percentage of the total population of nationals) for selected countries

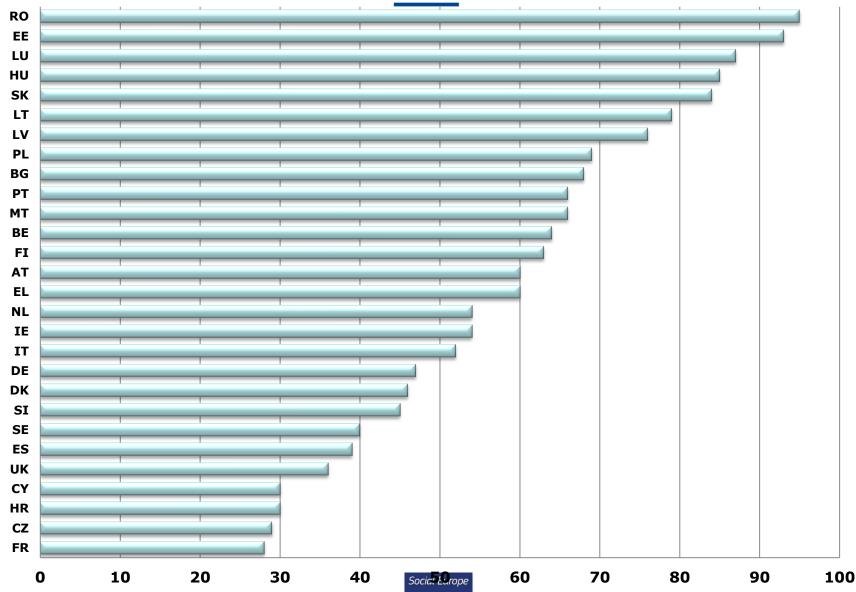
Mobile EU citizens and third-country nationals as a percentage of the total labour force, by country of residence, 2013



% EU migrants choosing the EU27 (2012)



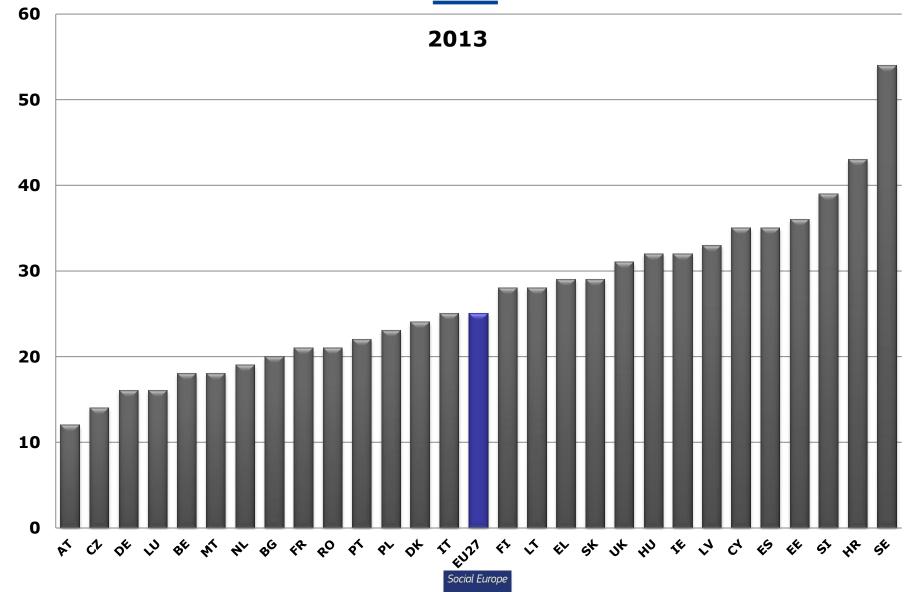

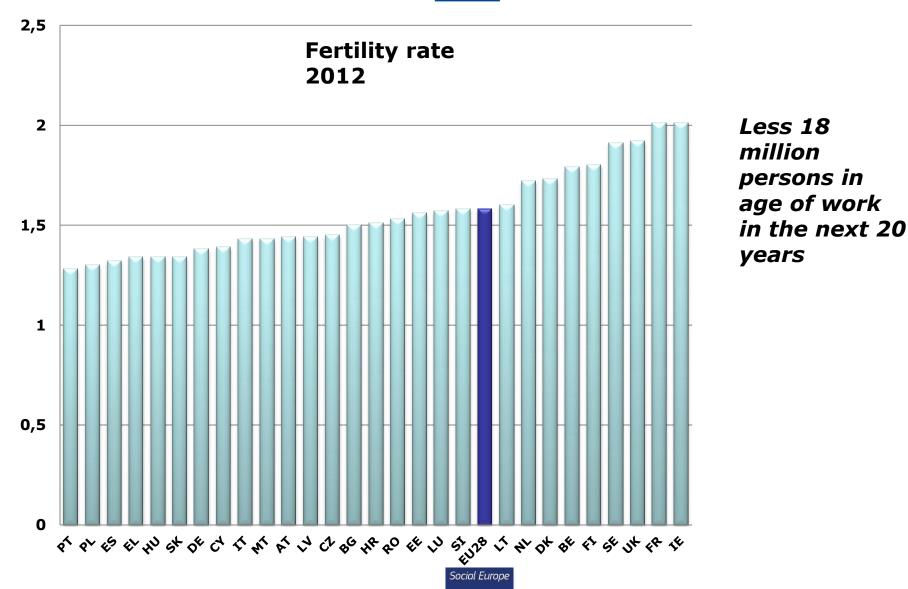

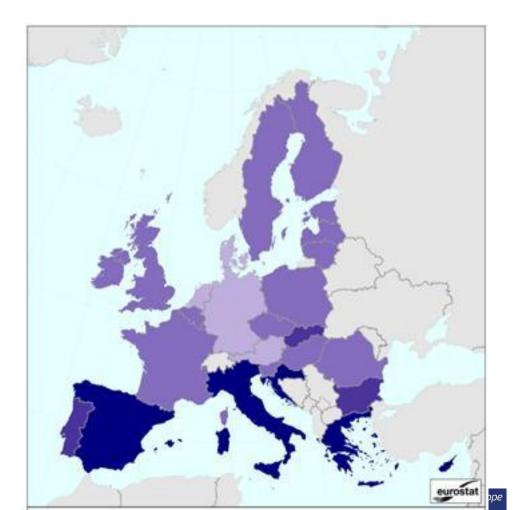
Demographic trends

Greece, Spain, Croatia: around /more than 50%

Austria, Germany, Netherlands: around /less than 10%

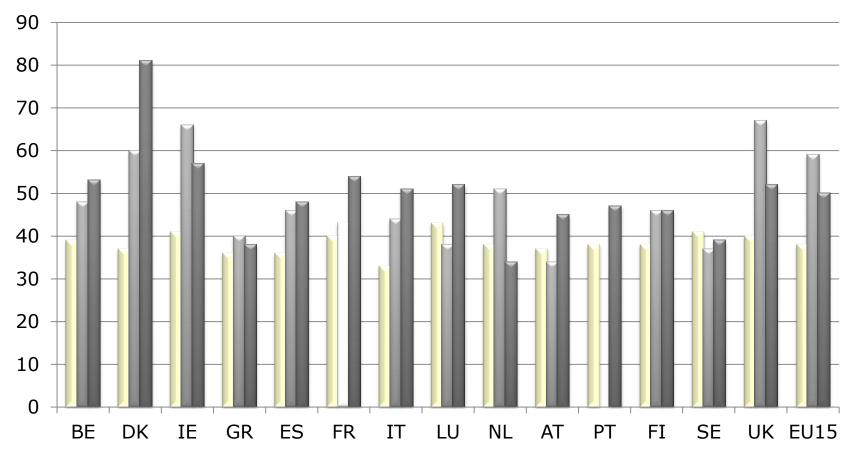

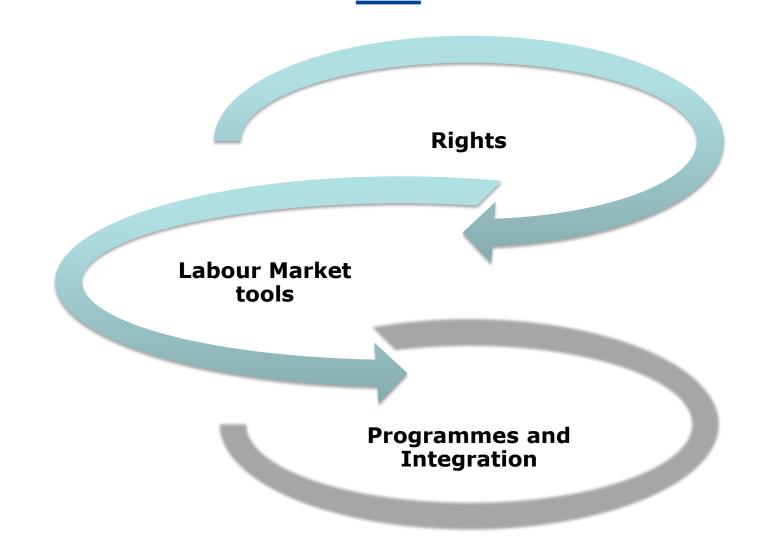

Directive 2014/54/EU of 16 April 2014 on measures facilitating the exercise of rights conferred onon measures facilitating the exercise of rights conferred on workers in the context of freedom of movement of workers

Mainstreaming

• Provisions concerning defence of rights including victimisation

Improve capacity to act

Associations can represent EU workers in legal proceedings

A Youth Guarantee

- Council Recommendation of 22 April 2013: Member States
 - \checkmark ensure that all young people up to 25
 - ✓ receive a good-quality offer of
 - employment, continued education, an apprenticeship or a traineeship
 - ✓ within four months of becoming unemployed or leaving formal education.





Quality Framework for Traineeships

Compulsory traineeship agreement to cover:

- learning content, mentorship, evaluation
- working conditions: weekly working time, limited duration, sick leave, holidays
- more transparency already in traineeship advertisment regarding
 - Compensation
 - Social security coverage
 - Hiring practices

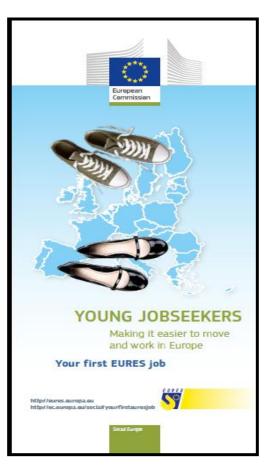

Target groups are young **people aged 18-30 and employers** (SMEs in particular).

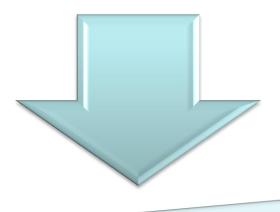
The scheme provides customised services and financial support.
